

Holy Week



Holy Week begin on Sunday 28th March. This week includes Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday. It marks a special time in our church leading up to the resurrection of Jesus.

Palm Sunday

On this day, we recount the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem on a donkey. Many people placed palms and cloaks on the ground to pave his way. Palm Sunday has a bitter-sweet tone. On the one hand the story is upbeat with the crowd joyfully proclaiming Christ as the long promised Messiah, yet by the end of the week, Jesus is crucified.





Holy Thursday

On this day, we recount how Jesus washed the feet of the disciples before the Last Supper. At the Last Supper, Jesus shared bread and wine with his disciples, asking them to think of Him. He knew he was about to be betrayed and condemned to death.

Good Friday

Good Friday marks the day God's Son, Jesus, was crucified. It was on this day that Jesus was beaten and tortured because he claimed to be the son of God. A crown of thorns was thrust upon his head. Then, he was forced to carry his own cross to the on top of a hill, where he was nailed to the cross.





Holy Saturday

This is the day in between Good Friday and Easter. This day marks Jesus body being placed in the tomb.

Easter Sunday

This day is all about the resurrection of Jesus. We celebrate Easter to remember the great sacrifice that Jesus made for us in order to save us. Easter Sunday helps us to remember that Jesus came back from the dead. Although he is not physically among us, He is still present in our hearts.

It is because Jesus rose from the dead on a Sunday that Christians call Sunday, "The Day of the Lord" and is the day of the week dedicated to worship.


As is the Church's liturgical custom there will be no morning Masses on Holy Thursday, Good Friday or Holy Saturday.

Social Emotional Wellbeing (SEW) Survey

At OLA, Grade 2-6 students complete the Social Emotional Wellbeing (SEW) Survey every year in November. We use results from the surveys to:

- Assess the wellbeing of students on an annual basis
- Identify the social and emotional needs of student groups
- Target resourcing to specific areas of need
- Measure the effectiveness of programs with pre-and post-surveys
- Report on wellbeing to parents and the school community.


At OLA we value social emotional literacy and provide students with many opportunities to grow in this area and develop a healthy wellbeing. The students are involved in Gratitude, Empathy and Mindfulness (GEM) moments, Make Jesus Real (MJR), Meditation and Learning Curve Wellbeing lessons.

The overall social-emotional wellbeing report provides a comparison of all students from your school and all schools, as distributed across each of the five developmental levels.







Feelings and Behavious

This domain focuses on the extent to which young people experience both positive emotions and behaviours (eg happiness, positive self-identity, and gets along with a variety of people) and negative emotions and behaviours (eg anger, stress, rule breaking behaviour).

87.8% of our Grade 2-6 students are developed in this area.






- 67. Choose an inspirational quote and create a poster for your room







Tennis





Microwave Strawberry Jam

500g strawberries

2 cups sugar

1/4 cup lemon juice

Rinse and hull Strawberries. Chop them into small pieces. Place them in a large microwave-safe bowl with the lemon juice. Heat on high (100% power) for 3 minutes or until soft. Stir in sugar and cook for a further 20 minutes on high (100% power) checking and stirring at least every 5 minutes and checking if the jam is set. Pour into sterilized jars and seal. Store in the refrigerator.
